3 MR. CONRADI: Good morning. Sorry
4 for being so late. We'll get started. First, I
5 want to apologize if any of y'all were here last
6 month. It got a little out of hand with UAB,
7 and I apologize for that. I call to -- has Tim
8 got here?

9 MR. DARBY: I haven't seen Tim.

10 MR. CONRADI: We're going to call the
11 November meeting of the Alabama Board of
12 Pharmacy to order. A majority of the members
13 are present. We need to adopt the agenda.

14 MR. BUNCH: I make a motion that we
15 adopt the agenda.

16 MR. DARBY: Second.

17 MR. CONRADI: All in favor?

18 MR. MCCONAGHY: Aye.

19 MR. DARBY: Aye.

20 MR. CONRADI: Aye.

21 MR. BUNCH: Aye.

22 MR. CONRADI: Okay. First thing up
23 is CVS Caremark of Florida. Step up here and

1 make sure that microphone light is on. Thank
2 you. I already told Jeff y'all were on the
3 front, so you may proceed.

4 MR. ROCCHIO: How are you? My name
5 is John Rocchio. I am the director of
6 regulatory compliance representing the state
7 with our company.

8 MS. RODRIGUEZ-GOMEZ: And my name is
9 Elizabeth Rodriguez-Gomez. I'm from CVS
10 Caremark in Hollywood, Florida.

11 MR. CONRADI: Go ahead. I'm sorry.
12 Speak loud enough for her to hear you. She's
13 got you on the record. So move that microphone
14 closer to you.

15 MS. RODRIGUEZ-GOMEZ: And we're here
16 today to present a request for a pharmacy
17 services permit. We are a community licensed
18 pharmacy in the State of Florida. What we
19 currently do in our facility is prescription
20 data entry, drug utilization review, and
21 prescription verification. We primarily service
22 our CVS Caremark patients and clients, members,
23 and we're under a central database that is used

1 in processing of all our prescriptions.

2 Just a little bit of background,
3 we've been licensed with Alabama for the last
4 ten years. The reason we're here is during the
5 change of location of our facility, we were
6 recommended to move our permit from a
7 non-resident pharmacy license to a pharmacy
8 services permit. The reason for it is that we
9 do not have a dispensing site any longer. We're
10 only a front end operation.

11 Filling of the prescription, as
12 mentioned -- filling of the prescription is
13 mentioned, prescription entries, DUR reviews,
14 and prescription verification. Hours of
15 operation are 9:00 to 5:00 Monday through
16 Friday, and we do have pharmacists accessibility
17 24/7 every day of the year.

18 Basically, if you have any questions
19 for us at this point in time. This is a summary
20 of what I currently just expressed to you.

21 MR. DARBY: You're just a data entry,
22 prescription entry?

23 MS. RODRIGUEZ-GOMEZ: We have

1 prescription entry. We do the verification of
2 the prescription there. And if there's any type
3 of conflicts on the prescription itself, then
4 the pharmacist will review it as well.

5 MR. DARBY: How many pharmacists are
6 at this location?

7 MS. RODRIGUEZ-GOMEZ: There's a total
8 of forty pharmacists, including myself,
9 management team.

10 MR. DARBY: And you're the
11 supervising?

12 MS. RODRIGUEZ-GOMEZ: I'm the
13 supervising pharmacist for them.

14 MR. CONRADI: Are you inputting for
15 retail or for mail order?

16 MS. RODRIGUEZ-GOMEZ: No, this is
17 mail order.

18 MR. DARBY: The prescriptions y'all
19 input, where are they actually filled?

20 MS. RODRIGUEZ-GOMEZ: They would end
21 up being filled, dispensed out of our Illinois
22 facility or out of our Pennsylvania facility.

23 MR. DARBY: And some of these would

1 be shipped in to people from Alabama?

2 MS. RODRIGUEZ-GOMEZ: Yes. It will
3 be shipped to residents of Alabama.

4 MR. DARBY: That's all I've got.

5 MR. CONRADI: Any more questions?

6 MR. BUNCH: No more questions.

7 MR. DARBY: Do we need to approve
8 that?

9 MR. CONRADI: Motion to approve?

10 MR. DARBY: I make a motion we grant
11 the pharmacy permit to CVS Caremark.

12 MR. BUNCH: Second.

13 MR. CONRADI: All in favor?

14 MR. MCCONAGHY: Aye.

15 MR. DARBY: Aye.

16 MR. CONRADI: Aye.

17 MR. BUNCH: Aye.

18 MR. MARTIN: Aye.

19 MR. CONRADI: Thank y'all for coming.

20 MS. RODRIGUEZ-GOMEZ: Thank you.

21 MR. CONRADI: I think everybody --
22 most everybody is here. I don't see Louise yet.
23 So we'll start on the --

1 PARTICIPANT: She's on her way.

2 MR. CONRADI: Well, I know that.

3 They were asking, You've forgot to have
4 everybody introduced. I was trying to wait
5 until she got here. If you would, we will do
6 like we normally do. Start on the front row.
7 Tell who you are and who you represent loud
8 enough for the court reporter to hear you so we
9 can record who is here for the meeting.

10 MS. ANDERSON: I'm Crystal Anderson.
11 I'm now employed with the State Board of
12 Pharmacy, and I am the director of compliance.

13 MS. ELLENBURG: Mitzi Ellenburg,
14 Board of Pharmacy.

5 would like to say Donna Yateman is going to be
6 my replacement for next year, so I feel sorry
7 for her. The Treasury report, Dan?

8 MR. MCCONAGHY: I've got it in the
9 Dropbox. Unless you've got any questions, it's
10 going to be real short and concise. We're into
11 a new year, but we have already collected thirty
12 percent of our budget on licensing fees, which
13 is pretty amazing to be this early in the
14 season. And our expenses that we have incurred
15 so far are within like point five percent of
16 what we had budgeted. So that's all in line
17 with where it should be, and we've still got
18 money in the checkbook. So if you've got any
19 questions, that's all my report.

20 MR. CONRADI: Any questions?

21 MR. DARBY: I make a motion we accept
22 the treasurer's report.

23 MR. BUNCH: Second.

1 MR. CONRADI: All in favor?

2 MR. MCCONAGHY: Aye.

3 MR. DARBY: Aye.

4 MR. CONRADI: Aye.

5 MR. BUNCH: Aye.

6 MR. MARTIN: Aye.

7 MR. CONRADI: The wellness report
8 we're going to put off until about 10:00. The
9 board minutes we need to approve, assuming y'all
10 have turned in any corrections you needed to
11 Sheri.

12 MR. DARBY: I make a motion we
13 approve the Board minutes from the October 15th
14 meeting.

15 MR. BUNCH: Second.

16 MR. CONRADI: All in favor.

17 MR. MCCONAGHY: Aye.

18 MR. DARBY: Aye.

19 MR. CONRADI: Aye.

20 MR. BUNCH: Aye.

21 MR. MARTIN: Aye.

22 MR. DARBY: I make a motion we

23 approve the Board minutes of the work session

1 from October 15th.

2 MR. BUNCH: Second.

3 MR. CONRADI: All in favor?

4 MR. MCCONAGHY: Aye.

5 MR. DARBY: Aye.

6 MR. CONRADI: Aye.

7 MR. BUNCH: Aye.

8 MR. MARTIN: Aye.

9 MR. DARBY: I make a motion we
10 approve the interview minutes from October 15th.

11 MR. BUNCH: Second.

12 MR. CONRADI: All in favor?

13 MR. MCCONAGHY: Aye.

14 MR. DARBY: Aye.

15 MR. CONRADI: Aye.

16 MR. BUNCH: Aye.

17 MR. MARTIN: Aye.

18 MR. CONRADI: Susan, do you have the
19 inspector's report?

20 MS. ALVERSON: I do. We completed
21 fifty-eight inspections in October. We received
22 eleven complaints. We completed fifteen
23 complaints, because we had -- we were completing

1 what was from the month before.

2 We had inspectors attend the Attorney
3 General's Law Enforcement Summit. Three
4 inspectors assisted the FBI in a search warrant
5 of a pharmacy in Alabama. Three inspectors
6 attended the NASCSA, N-A-S-C-S-A, conference,
7 and our inspectors also attended Multigon this
8 month. All right. So that's the inspector's
9 report.

10 MR. CONRADI: On the complaints, how
11 far -- how long is it averaging taking from the
12 time it comes in until the time it's resolved?

13 MS. ALVERSON: I would say for half
14 of them we're averaging three to four weeks now,
15 because we handle them in a meeting before the
16 board meets, and a number of those you see in
17 what's presented to you in the report. If it's
18 determined it has to go on to Jim, we're getting
19 them back from Jim before the next board
20 meeting, and they are being dealt with in the
21 next board meeting.

22 So I would say nothing is taking more
23 than two months unless it's an exceptional case

1 with a lot of complications.

2 MR. CONRADI: Any other questions?

3 The secretary's report?

4 MS. ALVERSON: We've spent a lot of
5 time in inspections for sterile and non-sterile
6 compounding this month. Crystal, as you know,
7 is our newest employee, and so we've been doing
8 a lot of training with her, and I think she's
9 seen things now she wasn't expecting to see and
10 understand.

11 We have met with the Board of Nursing
12 about their computer system and really liked it,
13 but as I've told you in the past, they spent a
14 lot of money on that system. So we have met --
15 or I have met with that company, and they made
16 us a promise that whatever we are paying now,
17 they will come in below that cost for the full
18 system that the nursing program has. And there
19 will be somebody here in our building with us
20 probably fifty percent of the time, the full
21 time.

22 MR. BUNCH: When we go live?

23 MS. ALVERSON: Well, more than go

1 live. For the full install and while we're
2 getting used to it. So I want to get all of
3 that in writing. We have a meeting the Monday
4 after Thanksgiving, and then we're going to
5 demonstrate the program for the full staff to
6 make sure that they see it as workable for them,
7 because I would like to make a decision by the
8 time of the next board meeting, and we should
9 have the comparison of the three systems then
10 for you by the next board meeting.

11 MR. CONRADI: Make sure Joe is in
12 that meeting with you.

13 MS. ALVERSON: Okay. I will.

14 MR. BUNCH: Refresh my memory. Are
15 they local? Do they have an office here?

16 MS. ALVERSON: They are out of
17 Florida. Well, we have two, one that's in Texas
18 and one that's in Florida. But the one we're
19 talking about now is in Florida, but they both
20 have an office in Atlanta. And the person who
21 is the supervisor for all installs is in
22 Atlanta. And he's probably in Birmingham one
23 out of every two weeks.

1 And two other state agencies have
2 also signed with them now. The real estate
3 board has signed with them, and I'm not sure of
4 the other state agency that has signed with
5 them. But because we all have very similar
6 needs, they are able to use one system that's
7 already built. That doesn't mean it won't take
8 tweaking.

9 MR. CONRADI: Does it have an
10 enforcement side to it?

11 MS. ALVERSON: It does have an
12 enforcement side. So I'm feeling pretty
13 optimistic about that system right now.

14 MR. CONRADI: We did about the last
15 one.

16 MS. ALVERSON: I understand. That's
17 why I am --

18 MR. MARTIN: I hope we're getting
19 smarter.

20 MS. ALVERSON: That's my hope, that
21 we're looking at more things, and we'll have
22 more in the contract. So all right. I have
23 asked the two schools of pharmacy to bring a

1 proposal to the Board. They have some concerns
2 about people who are being assessed. The
3 assessment takes a while. By the -- if they are
4 found to not have a problem, by the time that
5 process is finished, the student cannot finish
6 that semester of school.

7 MR. MARTIN: Like a wellness
8 assessment?

9 MS. ALVERSON: Right.

10 MR. CONRADI: So they are making them
11 sit out while they have the assessment?

12 MS. ALVERSON: Well, because they've
13 been identified with a problem, we take their
14 intern/extern license. And the schools will not
15 allow them to continue without an intern/extern
16 license. And the way the curriculum is now,
17 students start in their first year being out on
18 rotations. It's not like waiting until the end.
19 And so they really cannot go on rotations if
20 they don't have an intern/extern license.

21 And we're -- for the schools, they
22 must sign a contract with all the places where
23 they place students saying that there is no

1 issue with the student having an impairment
2 problem. So if the school knows there's a
3 potential one, it's too high a risk. They can't
4 do that. That would violate their contract.

5 MR. CONRADI: So it's not us as much
6 as it is -- I mean, we're not taking their
7 intern license before we find out they have a
8 problem, are we?

9 MS. ALVERSON: Yes, we are. I mean,
10 if it's reported that they have a problem, yes,
11 we do take their --

12 MR. CONRADI: So they do have a
13 problem. We're just getting them assessed to
14 see how bad a problem?

15 MS. ALVERSON: Right. For instance,
16 you know, was it a bad decision on a Saturday
17 night after a football game or do you have a
18 drinking problem?

19 MR. WARD: That takes a week. Once
20 you go into a facility, the assessment is
21 completed within a week.

22 MS. ALVERSON: Right. But getting a
23 bed in a facility, finding the money, getting

1 insurance, that takes a couple of weeks.

2 MR. WARD: So we should change the
3 whole program because a couple of students?
4 They have a couple of students?

5 MS. ALVERSON: Well, we would like to
6 talk about what are the other possibilities.

7 MR. WARD: Well, the assessment has
8 to be valid. That's the whole point.

9 MS. ALVERSON: I understand, but we
10 would like to -- we're proposing to the Board,
11 couldn't we talk about other possibilities?

12 MR. MARTIN: So I think from the
13 school's standpoint, obviously they are not
14 going to allow the student to function in that
15 experiential environment without the proper
16 credentials, and we're saying there appears to
17 be an issue related to -- possibly related to
18 the ability of the person to make a good or bad
19 decision in that environment because they may be
20 impaired. So that's the reason we're holding
21 back on that.

22 MS. ALVERSON: That's right.

23 MR. MARTIN: So it's kind of like a

1 catch twenty-two. Until we satisfy ourselves
2 that they are not a harm to patients, you know,
3 we're not going to let them have the certificate
4 back. And until they get the certificate back,
5 they are not going to be able to practice in the
6 experiential environment.

7 MS. ALVERSON: Right.

8 MR. CONRADI: Sounds like even if
9 they have the intern/extern license or permit or
10 whatever you want to call it, they can't go
11 there anyway if there's a cloud above them,
12 right?

13 MS. ALVERSON: Right. The school
14 still --

15 MR. CONRADI: So it doesn't have
16 really anything to do with the intern/extern
17 license.

18 MR. MARTIN: Well, I think that's
19 probably the school's simplest way of saying
20 that's --

21 MR. CONRADI: That's not our problem,
22 it's yours?

23 MR. MARTIN: Yeah, yeah.

1 MS. ALVERSON: And having been in
2 that position, I know I've found ways to have
3 people assessed in less than a week. So I don't
4 think it necessarily takes that long that you
5 always have to be an inpatient to be assessed
6 whether you have a problem.

7 MR. WARD: Dr. Garver will differ
8 with you about that.

9 MS. ALVERSON: And we're just asking
10 could we talk about it.

11 MR. WARD: Why don't we wait for him
12 to get here so we can involve him?

13 MS. ALVERSON: Well, I wanted to put
14 it in my report so you knew what I was doing
15 this month.

16 MR. CONRADI: We appreciate it. We
17 like to know.

18 MR. BUNCH: You don't want to debate
19 it now. You just want to get it before the
20 Board?

21 MS. ALVERSON: Right. I'm just
22 trying to tell you what I've been working on
23 this month.

1 MR. MARTIN: Has he been part of the
2 discussion yet?

3 MS. ALVERSON: No. So you're part of
4 the beginning of the discussion, all right?
5 I've been appointed to a national committee to
6 write standards for pharmacy technicians
7 compounding hazardous drugs, and so I'll be in
8 Chicago for a couple of days doing that the end
9 of this week.

10 MR. CONRADI: You'll be close to home
11 then.

12 MS. ALVERSON: I hope there's a
13 little snow left on the ground when I get there,
14 at least a little for me. So the registration
15 or renewal of licenses has been going forward.
16 The ones with the pharmacists seem to be doing
17 pretty well. Lynn has been working very hard,
18 but the out of state renewals are moving along
19 very smoothly.

20 The interview process that we've
21 adapted has gone really well. We've had some
22 glitches with renewing businesses because GLS
23 has been behind in getting every one of those up

1 to standard. But Terry and Dianne and Ronda
2 have been working with them. And so we've been
3 able to renew everything, but we have had a few
4 glitches. In case somebody in the community
5 says it was hard renewing my precursor license,
6 you'll know that they are telling you the truth.

7 MR. MARTIN: Can I back up to the
8 tech training?

9 MS. ALVERSON: Yes.

10 MR. MARTIN: So this is through NAVP?

11 MS. ALVERSON: No. This is through
12 the Hematology/Oncology Pharmacy Society.

13 MR. MARTIN: HOPA. So do you know
14 the status? I've lost touch with the status of
15 the USP 800. I knew it was out for comment.

16 MS. ALVERSON: The comment period
17 ended July 31st, and I think it's like most
18 other things. We're just kind of waiting for
19 USP to decide how they are going to handle those
20 comments, if they are going to change things.
21 So I don't know where it stands, but it wouldn't
22 surprise me to receive it in a final form any
23 day.

1 MR. MARTIN: So HOPA is expecting
2 that there's enough of 800 ready to go to set up
3 a training around what would be needed to be
4 compliant with 800 once it gets official?

5 MS. ALVERSON: Yes. Plus, I think
6 they feel that too frequently the literature and
7 standards are -- say pharmacists, and too
8 frequently pharmacists may not train their
9 technicians well enough to protect them. And so
10 they are hoping to come out with a document that
11 also addresses the need to protect technicians.

12 MR. MARTIN: Thank you.

13 MS. ALVERSON: You're welcome. And
14 that's the month.

15 MR. CONRADI: Any questions? Mr.
16 Ward, do you have any report on the attorney?

17 MR. WARD: No. Just for executive
18 session.

19 MR. CONRADI: Old business? I've got
20 one item I know of. We need to vote on the
21 proposed guidelines for methadone pharmacy
22 activities. I think all y'all got a copy of
23 that.

1 MS. ALVERSON: Could I make a
2 comment? We did get a letter forty-eight hours
3 ago with two questions, and Mr. Brinkman --

4 MR. BRINKMAN: Right here
5 (indicating).

6 MS. ALVERSON: Oh, you moved.

7 MR. BRINKMAN: Yeah.

8 MS. ALVERSON: You had a question.
9 If we could resolve this now, we could vote and
10 be done this month. I'm sorry.

11 MR. CONRADI: We want to vote and be
12 done this month either way. I'm tired of
13 fooling with it almost five years.

14 MS. ALVERSON: Mr. Brinkman, what
15 needs to go on the label is exactly what DPA
16 says. So it would be nothing different than the
17 standard label and DPA.

18 MR. BRINKMAN: That's what I figured.
19 I wanted to hear it from y'all.

20 MS. ALVERSON: You wanted to be sure
21 from the horse's mouth?

22 MR. BRINKMAN: Correct. And we had a
23 question on what medication pass area meant.

1 That was a term y'all used in the guidelines,
2 and I wasn't sure what it meant, and I wanted to
3 make sure.

4 MS. ALVERSON: We were not
5 considering a separate area or walled off area
6 or a taped off area. I guess in my mind I was
7 thinking where the pharmacist is standing, okay?

8 MR. BRINKMAN: Okay. That's fine.
9 And then I had one other clarification.

10 MS. ALVERSON: Right. About
11 designated stock?

12 MR. BRINKMAN: Right. The way we do
13 business is a little different than the way the
14 other facilities do business, and in the letter
15 it explained the way we do business, and we
16 wanted to have one safe or multiple safes where
17 you would have both the administered and the
18 take-home doses together because of the way we
19 operate. And so I explained the way we operated
20 in the letter and asked for an exception to the
21 general rule that y'all established in the
22 guidelines based on the way we do business. I
23 think it's in the last paragraph of the letter

1 that I sent to Jim a couple of days ago. And I
2 apologize for the late delivery of the letter.

3 MS. ALVERSON: Well, we were just
4 tied up all day yesterday. We left here -- I
5 was going to say it was dark, but that doesn't
6 imply anything.

7 MR. BRINKMAN: I speak for my clients
8 and thank y'all also for the work y'all put in,
9 particularly Jim and Susan, on developing the
10 guidelines. We're grateful for y'all's
11 resolution of that issue. So I wanted to make
12 that point clear. But I wanted a clarification
13 if possible.

14 MS. ALVERSON: One of the things we
15 didn't think of but somebody else did was if
16 there had to be a separate stock for
17 pharmacists, for instance, if there were powders
18 or what they were going to mix, it actually
19 could be put in a box that's locked and put in
20 one safe. That's still a separated pharmacist
21 only. If you are ordering and receiving all
22 unit dose -- is that my understanding?

23 MR. BRINKMAN: Yes.

1 MS. ALVERSON: If the pharmacist
2 could check out of stock what they need for the
3 day, I think we can work around that, all right?

4 MR. BRINKMAN: And if possible, if
5 you want to adopt the guidelines and then let me
6 work with Jim and Susan on the issue, we can
7 certainly do that post-meeting if that would be
8 -- if that would suit the Pharmacy Board as
9 well.

10 MS. ALVERSON: I feel I have a few
11 things I have to stick to to be true to the
12 pharmacy law. I think the pharmacist's control
13 of what is dispensed on an outpatient basis is
14 kind of critical to what I see or my
15 understanding from the Board also as being able
16 to satisfy our end of the equation also. But we
17 will work on that.

18 MR. BRINKMAN: Okay.

19 MR. MARTIN: I move we adopt the
20 guidelines as proposed.

21 MR. DARBY: I second it.

22 MR. CONRADI: All in favor?

23 MR. MCCONAGHY: Aye.

1 MR. DARBY: Aye.

2 MR. CONRADI: Aye.

3 MR. BUNCH: Aye.

4 MR. MARTIN: Aye.

5 MR. CONRADI: And would you identify
6 yourself?

7 MR. BRINKMAN: I'm sorry. I'm Steve
8 Brinkman. I'm a lawyer at Sirote & Permutt. I
9 represent Colonial Management Group.

10 MR. CONRADI: Thank you.

11 MR. WARD: Susan, when you get a
12 chance, will you just put down in writing what
13 you said to him so we've got it so it's clear,
14 please, ma'am?

15 MS. ALVERSON: Yes.

16 MR. CONRADI: Do y'all have any other
17 old business? New business? We've got the
18 meeting dates for next year. I think y'all have
19 a copy of those.

20 MR. DARBY: I make a motion we
21 approve the meeting dates according to the
22 printout we have.

23 MR. BUNCH: Second.

1 MR. MARTIN: May I have some
2 discussion?

3 MR. CONRADI: Any discussion?

4 MR. MARTIN: Understanding that
5 occasionally these could have to move for one
6 reason or another.

7 MR. CONRADI: Oh, yeah, they can be
8 changed.

9 MR. MARTIN: And these are published,
10 what, thirty days or more? Is that the
11 requirement?

12 MR. CONRADI: Susan?

13 MR. MARTIN: These are --

14 MS. ALVERSON: Oh, yes. And that's
15 in Mitzi's hands, and she is very responsible.

16 MS. ELLENBURG: You have to post them
17 to the Secretary of State's website thirty days
18 prior, and you have to give them thirty days
19 prior notice if you intend to change it.

20 MR. MARTIN: Okay.

21 MR. CONRADI: We just post them one
22 month at a time?

23 MS. ELLENBURG: I usually post them

1 for the year. If you would rather I --

2 MR. CONRADI: And if we need to
3 change it, you just --

4 MR. MARTIN: Either way. As long as
5 people know, you know, they have to come back
6 and check to see if the date is changed, you
7 know, that's fine.

8 MR. MCCONAGHY: That's what I think
9 Tim and I want to know, is there a procedure if
10 something comes up in October that needs to be
11 changed, that would need to be -- we would need
12 to go through to make that change.

13 MS. ELLENBURG: It has to be sent to
14 the Secretary of State thirty days prior to the
15 date of the change.

16 MR. MCCONAGHY: Would that go through
17 you?

18 MS. ELLENBURG: Yes.

19 MR. MARTIN: Just like they got
20 posted to begin with, just change it thirty days
21 prior to?

22 MS. ELLENBURG: Yes.

23 MR. MARTIN: Do you want to vote?

1 MR. CONRADI: Any more questions?

2 Discussion? All in favor?

3 MR. MCCONAGHY: Aye.

4 MR. DARBY: Aye.

5 MR. CONRADI: Aye.

6 MR. BUNCH: Aye.

7 MR. MARTIN: Aye.

8 MR. CONRADI: Do we have any other
9 items we need to discuss other than executive
10 session? I assume you have some items for
11 executive session. I know Mr. Ward does.

12 MR. MARTIN: We do.

13 MR. CONRADI: Hang on just a minute.
14 Let me get my cheat sheet here. I thought that
15 might be Garver coming in.

16 MR. MARTIN: Do we have his report?

17 MR. CONRADI: Do you have his report,
18 Garver's report?

19 MS. ALVERSON: I don't. I could ask
20 Terry to print it from the Dropbox.

21 MR. CONRADI: Is it in the Dropbox?

22 MR. MARTIN: If it's in the Dropbox,
23 one of us can read it in.

1 MS. ELLENBURG: I've got it right
2 here (indicating).

3 MR. CONRADI: Do you want to read it
4 in, Susan?

5 MS. ALVERSON: There are a hundred
6 and forty-one people in our screening program
7 with signed contracts or orders. This includes
8 individuals who have a diagnostic monitoring
9 contract, but does not include any of the
10 professionals that I'm going to mention now. We
11 have one pharmacist in inpatient. There's a
12 pharmacist who is going to be entering treatment
13 in two weeks. That's that time frame I talked
14 about. Sometimes it takes a while to get in.

15 There are nineteen pharmacists who
16 are being held out for some reason or in the
17 process of being investigated, evaluated, or
18 made ready for presentation.

19 There is one tech in treatment, seven
20 techs who are being held out for some reason, or
21 in the process of being investigated, evaluated,
22 or made ready for presentation.

23 There is one student who has

1 completed outpatient treatment who has refused
2 recommendation and who needs disposition.

3 There's one student who has relapsed who has
4 withdrawn from school and may not be able to
5 return to school, and that needs disposition.

6 There's one student having an evaluation this
7 week.

8 All of the individuals who are in
9 treatment or in evaluation or undecided are
10 presently out of the workplace and without a
11 license. There are eighty-two individuals in
12 facility-driven aftercare. We have met
13 personally with all licensees returning to work
14 to sign contracts and explain how monitoring
15 works. All returning licensees have been placed
16 in the Caduceus either pharmacy or health
17 professional. Submitted by Dr. Garver.

18 MR. WARD: The student you mentioned
19 who doesn't want to go through the program, I've
20 prepared a necessary statement on that one. Do
21 you know which one I'm talking about? So that
22 will be set.

23 MR. CONRADI: All right. Thank you,

1 Susan.

2 MS. ALVERSON: You're welcome.

3 MR. CONRADI: Any other business?

4 MR. MCCONAGHY: Mark, I guess as a
5 point of information, the long-term care
6 automated dispensing that we've talked about,
7 I'll take the blame or credit, whichever one,
8 whichever way you take it, that it didn't get
9 presented this month. It's being put into the
10 rule format, and I think part of what -- about
11 my only hold up on it was looking to see what
12 other rules and laws are already in effect that
13 it might affect, and that's the one thing we
14 hadn't really looked at. So I'm trying to go
15 back and look at that before it actually got
16 submitted. So I would ideally say it will be
17 submitted at the next meeting.

18 MR. CONRADI: Thank you, Dan. Any
19 questions? I would like to make a motion that
20 we retire into executive session for the
21 purposes of discussing professional competence,
22 general reputation, character, licensees and
23 registrants of the Board. We're going into

1 executive session at let's say 9:50. We'll come
2 out at 10:45. When we come out, there will be
3 no other -- what's wrong Mitzi?

4 MS. ELLENBURG: I told Cara, this has
5 got to be a new record.

6 MR. CONRADI: Yeah. Wait until next
7 month.

8 MS. ELLENBURG: I'm not complaining,
9 you understand.

10 MR. CONRADI: At which time we'll
11 vote on cases that we heard in executive session
12 and adjourn. If no other business, we'll be
13 done. If you want to hang around until then and
14 hear us vote, you can.

15 MR. MARTIN: Second.

16 MR. CONRADI: We need an individual
17 vote on going into executive session. How do
18 you vote? Mr. McConaghy?

19 MR. MCCONAGHY: Aye.

20 MR. CONRADI: Mr. Darby?

21 MR. DARBY: Aye.

22 MR. CONRADI: Dr. Martin?

23 MR. MARTIN: Aye.

1 MR. BUNCH: Aye.

2 MR. CONRADI: Aye. All in favor. We
3 will go into executive session at 9:50. Thank
4 y'all for coming.

5

6 (Whereupon, a recess was taken for
7 executive session from 9:50 a.m. to 11:07 a.m.)

8

9 MR. CONRADI: We're back out of
10 executive session. We've got complaints we
11 discussed in executive session, Complaint Number
12 14-0148, 14-0150, 14-0152. The recommendation
13 was permanent surrender.

14 MR. MARTIN: I move we accept the
15 recommendation as submitted.

16 MR. CONRADI: All in favor?

17 MR. DARBY: I second that.

18 MR. CONRADI: All in favor?

19 MR. MCCONAGHY: Aye.

3 going to vote down our own recommendation.

4 MR. DARBY: We're pretty
5 schizophrenic.

6 MR. CONRADI: We had a request from a
7 pharmacist, Bill Haney, to allow him to be a
8 supervising pharmacist, and we approved that.
9 All in favor? I guess we need a motion.

10 MR. DARBY: I make a motion we allow
11 Bill Haney to be a supervising pharmacist.

12 MR. MARTIN: Second.

13 MR. CONRADI: All in favor?

14 MR. MCCONAGHY: Aye.

15 MR. DARBY: Aye.

16 MR. BUNCH: Aye.

17 MR. MARTIN: Aye.

18 MR. CONRADI: I abstain from that
19 one, and that's the end of our business.
